SHEFFIELD LOCAL ASSOCIATION OF BOY SCOUTS.**THIRD ANNUAL REPORT.**

In presenting the Third Annual Report for your consideration and approval, your Executive Committee beg to point out that the passed year reveals the value of the previous year's training of Troops by the Scoutmasters and the Educational Committee's Evening Classes.

A glance at the list of Prize Winners at the Doncaster and Birmingham Rallies will exemplify this. Therefore, your Executive has every confidence in asking you to pass a vote of thanks to the Scoutmasters, the Sheffield Educational Authorities, the Fire Brigade, and the Instructors who collectively have exercised such patience and devotion and given ungrudgingly, time and thought to the welfare of the future citizens of this great city.

FINANCE.

A statement of receipts and payments is annexed which shows :—

These figures include a profit of £12 0s. 7d. made at the Rally, May, 1913, and of £7 15s. 10d. made at the Sports last year. The accounts for this year's Sports could not be completed before the Annual Meeting and will be included in next year's Report.

As regards the Rally, the actual profit was £29 10s. 7d., of which £17 10s. 0d. was afterwards distributed among those troops which had been present, to pay a portion of the expenditure they had incurred in producing their displays.

STRENGTH.

The census was taken on the 30th September and is as follows : 56 Officers, 18 Warranted Officials, 743 Scouts, of whom 24 are King's Scouts. There are also 4 Silver Wolves in the Association.

BADGES.

The Badges issued during the year show a decrease against those earned last year. This is accounted for by the adoption of new regulations formed in the early part of the year. However, the Badge Committee have been hard at work and have produced a scheme which was passed at the Annual Meeting and which it is hoped will place the issue of Badges on a sound footing. These new rules have been issued to all concerned.

It might be of interest to note here an extract from the speech of the President of the Educational Section of the British Association this year. In dealing with the Boy Scout Movement Principal Griffiths deplored much in our modern methods of teaching, but spoke of Sir Robert Baden-Powell as the greatest educator of us all. "I believe," he said, "that the Boy Scout movement is rendering greater service than our complicated State machinery in preparing those who are brought within its influence for the struggles of life. It is a matter of regret that so small a fraction of the children in our schools is able to share its benefits. I only wish it were possible for our political system to admit the appointment of Baden Powell as Minister of Education, with plenary powers, for the next ten years."

The Scouts training for the Fireman's, Surveyor's, Handyman's, Metal Worker's, and Cook's Badges have had exceptional advantages given them by the Evening School Classes, and by the Officials of the Fire Brigade. Your Committee take this opportunity of expressing their indebtedness for the assistance received from these authorities.

OUT-DOOR WORK.

This work has been greatly aided by the generous conduct of the Farmers in allowing Troops to camp on their grounds, also by His Grace the Duke of Norfolk, who, through his agent, Mr. Coverdale, has allowed excellent accommodation to be obtained at Hollow Meadows for Standing Camps.

Camps have also been established at Birmingham, Dore, Little Matlock, Ringinglow, Rifle Range, Totley, Wharnccliffe Craggs, Birley Woods, Holmesfield, Cordwell Valley, Dronfield, Conway, and several other places on the coast, and one Troop was so fortunate as to be again invited to spend their holiday at Dundonald in Scotland.

This work has been helped forward by the forethought of the Hon. Treasurer, who has organised the resources and facilitated the means of transport by the provision of Trek-carts, the Troops, with few exceptions, now possessing suitable camp equipment.

This out-door work has been much appreciated by the Scouts and they have in many instances been able to perform their daily task of doing a good turn, and thus untie their knots, by repairing walls, putting out fires, and generally helping with the farmwork.

On one occasion the moors were set on fire by the carelessness of three youths who, owing to the scouts being required to extinguish the fire, managed to escape. The fire lasted for three and a half hours, during which time the Troop in question worked unceasingly. By such means they are able to make some small return for the kindness shewn to them.

THE GOLD THANKS BADGE

has been awarded to the following gentlemen : 2nd Officer F. W. Hadwick, for training Scouts in Fireman's Work and for rendering to the Association exceptional services in relation to Fire Displays at the Rally on May 3rd ; and to the Rev. William Blackshaw, M.A., B.D., who as Co-Chairman of the Association for several years, carried on the work in addition to his other heavy duties and has throughout the varying vicissitudes of

Scouting in Sheffield remained at his post until his leaving the City necessitated his resignation. The Association will feel his departure as a great loss. His personality and tact were appreciated by all with whom he came into contact. It was Mr. Blackshaw who gathered the few struggling patrols together in the early days of the movement and gave them a welcome at Croft Hall. The best wishes of the Association go with him for as great a success in whatever new task he takes up.

NEW DRILL BOOK.

A Drill Book has been compiled for the use of the Association, and issued to all concerned.

CLOTHING SCHEME.

The principal articles of clothing for Scouts are now supplied by the Association at wholesale prices. The thanks of the Association are due to Mr. B. E. Renton for kindly undertaking to look after and distribute the articles of uniform supplied, which may now be obtained at his premises at 22, Bow Street, but we learn he will shortly be moving into new premises.

SPORTS.

These were held on September, 1913, at the Training Ground of the Third West Riding Brigade, Royal Field Artillery, by the kind permission of Lieut.-Colonel C. Clifford, V.D. and Officers, when the cups presented last year and a good list of prizes were competed for.

Owing to the special Rally held in May and to the distance to the ground from the town, it was decided it was not advisable to go to much expense in advertisements, but there was a fair attendance of the public.

The prizes were kindly presented by Mr. J. Wortley Fawcett. The refreshments were undertaken by Scoutmaster J. Cross, of the St. Luke's Troop. Prizes were awarded in the form of vouchers exchangeable for goods on certain tradesmen. Several Troops camped on the ground for the night and a Church parade was held on the Sunday afternoon, an address being given by the Rev W. J. Cole, M.A., Vicar of St. Mary's.

BIRMINGHAM RALLY.

About 100 of our Officers and Boys were present to take part in the Great Birmingham Rally and to be inspected by H.R.H. Prince Arthur of Connaught.

RALLY AND PAGEANT.

Your Committee have to report that on May the 3rd a Rally and Pageant was held in Sheffield, in which all those taking part are to be congratulated. A great disappointment was received when the Chief Scout, General Sir Robert Baden-Powell, had, on account of ill-health, to cancel his engagement to be present, but your Committee, through the medium of the District Commissioner, were fortunate in being able to arrange for General Sir Herbert Plumer, K.C.B. Hon. Silver Wolf., to take his place.

The Owlerton Football Ground was kindly lent by the directors for the occasion. There was a large and appreciative company to witness the programme, which included camp life, bridge building, flag raiding, obstacle race, fire display, life-saving, and other amusing items. The afternoon finished with a general Rally arranged by the District Scoutmaster, which was very effective.

In the evening a meeting was held at the Artillery Drill Hall, where the Master Cutler, Mr. J. Rossiter Hoyle, presided, after entertaining at dinner an influential company, which afterwards supported him on the platform. The meeting opened with an exhibition of Sword Dancing (which was much appreciated), the Scouts taking part being trained by Lt. E. H. M. Nicholson, D.S.O., R.N. Speeches were made by the Master Cutler, General Plumer, the Lord Mayor, and the District Commissioner. The Secretary of the North of England Scouts was in attendance on General Plumer.

HEADQUARTERS.

With the increase in numbers of the Association and the extension of its work in the direction of Education and Training, the need of a special Headquarters premises is becoming more and more urgent.

The Association is at present indebted to the consideration and kindness of the Croft Hall Settlement for accommodation for their Committee and other meetings, and no permanent facilities exist for the many other requirements of the Association. Among these may be mentioned Secretarial and Administrative Offices, Headquarters for Scoutmasters' Training Troop, Gymnasium, Library, Stores, and Workshops; also a centre for Examinations for badges and a General Club Room for the Scouts of all Sheffield, which would be available for lectures and meetings.

It is hoped that an opportunity may arise in the near future to issue an appeal to those interested in the welfare of the rising generation, to enable the Association to provide suitable Headquarters. In view of the national importance and great value of the scouting movement, it is hoped that such an appeal will meet with the success it deserves.

SCOUTMASTER'S TRAINING TROOP.

A most important innovation has been the foundation of a Scoutmaster's Training Troop. The need for further Scoutmasters and more means of training those willing to become Scoutmasters has long been acutely felt. This Troop was formed in the Spring of 1913, and although membership was small the results have been satisfactory. The scheme of working is that the troop shall be under the control of a Scoutmaster, but that he shall be empowered to obtain all necessary help from those he believes to be best suited to give it.

Candidates need not have had any previous experience of scouting; it is, however, hoped that many old scouts will join when they feel themselves too old to remain in their troops as scouts.

Applications to join the troop should be made to Lieut. C. M. Foot, R.N., Endcliffe Mount, Endcliffe Vale Road.
