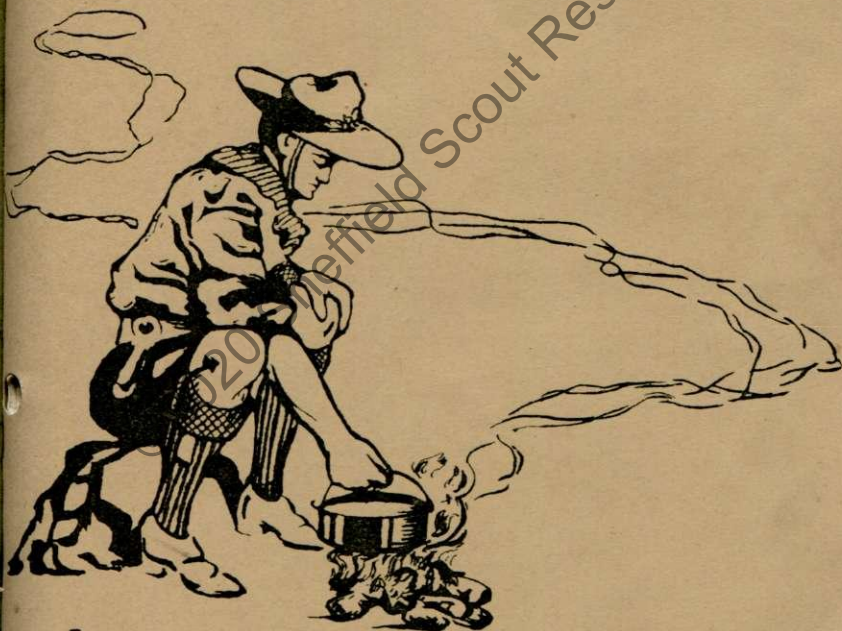

FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Executive Committee, in presenting this Fourth Annual Report can confidently say that the past year has been satisfactory in all respects. The general excellence of the Troops has been maintained, and they have grown in numbers from 30 to 40. There are other Troops in prospect.

An innovation has been the formation by one or two Troops of "Wolf Cub Packs," which are for the benefit of small boys of 6 to 11 years old who wish ultimately to become Scouts.

The success achieved during the year has been due very largely to the hard work of the Scoutmasters concerned, and the Committee feel that the very hearty thanks of the Association are due to them.

There have, of course, been other helpers, and the thanks of the Association are due also to the Education Authorities, to the Fire Brigade, and to the many farmers and sympathisers who have done so much for the Scouts all over the district.

A statement of receipts and payments is annexed, which shews :—

This includes the cost of prizes at the Sports held at Redmires in September and of the Swimming Gala held in October of last year.

The amount received from subscribers is £39 15s. 6d., compared with £46 0s. 6d. last year, and although it was hoped to bring our subscriptions up to £75 this year, the point was not pressed in view of the Chief Scout's larger appeal.

The thanks of the Association are again due to Mr. Edgar Jenkinson for kindly auditing the Accounts.

THE YEAR'S WORK.

The first incident of the year was the Swimming Gala held at the Glossop Road Baths in October, 1913.

This was the first occasion on which Swimming Sports had been held by the Association, and the keenness shown both in the practising and on the night itself was most gratifying.

One fact was certainly brought to light, namely, that there was a large number of Scouts who were unable to swim. This deficiency was at once tackled with the co-operation of the City Authorities, who most kindly made special arrangements whereby the Scouts could have their own swimming nights at the Corporation Street Baths for a very small charge. In this way Swimming Classes were arranged and most successfully carried through after Christmas.

One of the chief features of the winter's work was the Evening Classes arranged by the Education Authorities. These Classes were most excellent in every way, and were greatly appreciated both by the Scouts themselves and also by their Scoutmasters. The Committee again beg to tender their thanks to the authorities for the energetic way in which these Classes were organised.

The Winter Church Parade was held in the Artillery Drill Hall, Edmund Road, by the kind permission of Colonel Clifford and the Officers of the Artillery. A large number of Troops accompanied by their bands marched through the City to the service, when an inspiring address was given by our then Chaplain, the Lord Bishop of Sheffield (Dr. Quirk).

In the Spring, definite arrangements began to be made for the Rally and Exhibition which were to be held in July.

As soon as the various schemes had been formulated and decided upon, the Troops of the Association started practising their several parts for these events.

The Rally and Exhibition provided strenuous work for the whole Association right up to the time at which they were actually held.

In addition to this the usual Troop Camps began in the Spring, and practically all Troops managed to do a certain amount of camping, and those who were more fortunate kept standing Camps to which they were able to go every week-end.

The year's work is reflected to some extent in the Report of the Badge Committee.

The Honorary Secretary of that Committee reports that the following Badges have been issued during the year :—

The natural criticism on this list is that although the number of Proficiency Badges issued may be more or less satisfactory, the number of "first class" is not so.

A large number of Tenderfoot Badges have been issued, and this is a healthy sign, but it would seem that Scouts are not concentrating sufficient energy on perfecting themselves as Scouts, that is to say, on getting their first class Badges.

RALLY AND EXHIBITION, JULY, 1914.

July 18th, 1914, will long remain a red-letter day in the Sheffield Scout's diary. After all the work which had been put into the preparations for these events, it was very gratifying that it should be repaid by so great a success.

The Directors of the Sheffield Wednesday Football Club most kindly placed their Ground at the disposal of the Association for that day, and it is to their kindness that the success of the undertaking was so largely due.

Your Committee can report that the attendance of the public was good, and they understand that as a spectacle the Rally received great appreciation.

To the Scouts themselves especially, as well as to the general public, the presence of the Chief Scout, Sir Robert Baden-Powell was a source of the greatest delight.

Sir Robert had been obliged on previous occasions to cancel his engagement owing to illness, but on this day the Association was honoured not only by himself, but by the presence also of Lady Baden-Powell.

By means of a carefully-thought-out Tattoo March, every Scout was given an opportunity of seeing and saluting the Chief Scout. This march was followed by the "Rally" proper, after which the Chief addressed the Scouts.

In all some 1,200 Scouts attended the gathering, which included large numbers from Rotherham and North Derbyshire.

The Exhibition was held in the Corn Exchange on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, July 16th, 17th, and 18th, 1914.

The attendance on the first day was like that at most Exhibitions, namely, rather poor, but it improved enormously on the two latter days, and on Saturday evening the Committee had the satisfaction of seeing the Hall packed.

Some 18 Booths were arranged around the Hall, each Booth being occupied by a Troop at work at various branches of Scoutcraft, viz., Model Bridge Building, Cooking, Wireless Telegraphy, Joinery, Wood Carving, etc., etc.

The centre of the Hall was occupied by a Stadium and a Boxing Ring.

The Stadium was the scene of many lively Scout Games and also of excellent exhibitions of country dancing which had been arranged with much care by Lieut. E. H. M. Nicholson, R.N., D.S.O.

The boxing was a source of great interest both to the Scouts and to the public, and the Committee offer their warmest thanks to all those who kindly officiated as Judges, etc.

The Exhibition was opened on the first day by His Honour Judge Benson, on the second day by the Hon. F. S. Jackson, County Commissioner, and on the third day by Lady Baden-Powell.

The objects of the Exhibition and Rally were threefold:

Firstly, to help the Chief Scout in his strenuous efforts to raise an Endowment Fund which should place the Scout Movement in a thoroughly strong position throughout the country.

Secondly, to raise sufficient funds to provide a permanent Association Headquarters in Sheffield; and

Thirdly and chiefly, to interest the Sheffield public in Scouting and to give them a glimpse of the Scouts at work and at play.

Sir W. C. Leng & Co., Ltd. (the "Sheffield Daily Telegraph") were most kind in opening a Fund in connection with the above two objects, and the Committee wish to express their gratitude to them for this kindness, as well as to one and all of those who responded so freely to the appeal.

It was arranged that the proceeds of the Rally and Exhibition were to be added to the amount collected by the "Telegraph" Fund, and the total divided equally between the Chief Scout's Central Endowment Fund and the Sheffield Local Association, any subscriptions coming from the Rotherham area to be divided between Rotherham and the Endowment Fund.

The main object of the Rally was fully achieved: its results have been far-reaching, and would have been even more so had it not been for the outbreak of war.

From the point of view of finance, however, the results were not so successful. In the case of the Exhibition the initial outlay was very heavy, and it did not begin to pay well until the last evening; in other words, it was impossible to keep it open long enough to enable the receipts to show a profit. The Rally itself was more remunerative.

Several new Troops have sprung up since the Rally, one at any rate being a direct consequence of it; quite a number of men have also come forward to be trained as Scoutmasters.

Owing to the war, it was unfortunately necessary to close the "Telegraph" Fund when about £2,000 had been subscribed. This means that a sum of only £1,000 is available for the Sheffield Headquarters Scheme. This is not sufficient for any definite move to be made towards obtaining the necessary Headquarters, and the matter will probably therefore have to stand over until the termination of the present war.

Your Committee have every confidence in reporting the Exhibition and Rally as having been a great success, and that Scouting in Sheffield has received a great impetus, and they hereby beg to thank the very large number of people in Sheffield who contributed towards this success.

Annexed will be found a full list of the Subscribers to the "Telegraph" Fund.

HEADQUARTERS.

In the last Annual Report mention was made of the very great need of permanent Headquarters for the Association and of the intention of the Committee to appeal for funds to satisfy this need.

The above mentioned Rally and Exhibition were organised partly with a view to inaugurating this Fund, and, as stated

above the Fund was excellently started, but had unfortunately to be closed owing to the war, and the Committee now feel that no further steps can be taken for the time being.

PRESS REPORT.

Your Committee have great pleasure in mentioning the kind way in which the Sheffield Press continues to publish the Association Reports every week.

This arrangement is of the very greatest convenience to the Association, and the Committee beg to take this opportunity of thanking the proprietors of the "Sheffield Daily Telegraph" and the "Sheffield Independent" Press Co. for their very great kindness in continuing these facilities.

FOLDERS AND "GAZETTES."

During the year a Folder has been compiled by your Committee for the information and help of all concerned in Scouting.

The contents of the Folder include various memoranda from the different Sub-Committees, dealing with such subjects as Finance, Badges, etc., and also copies of the various Forms and Booklets in use in the Association.

In addition to these a Bulletin is issued from time to time giving an up-to-date report of the work and progress of the Association, and these Bulletins are so published as to be easily bound in the Folders.

A copy of this Folder has been issued to Scoutmasters, Members of the Executive Committee and various other persons interested in the movement, and an arrangement has also been made whereby the Headquarters "Gazette" is obtained at a cheap rate from the London Headquarters and distributed monthly to those Members of the Association who care to subscribe for the same.

CLOTHING SCHEME.

The Clothing Scheme continues to flourish, and most Troops now avail themselves of this means of obtaining their kit, which it is realised is as good and as cheap as possible.

The thanks of the Association are due to those gentlemen who kindly help with this Scheme.

THE WAR.

The present war has naturally had a great effect upon the movement.

It was decided to hold neither the Annual Sports nor the Swimming Gala in the Autumn as usual, but although the war has had its greatest effect in curtailing the energies of the Association in the above forms it has, however, provided an excellent opportunity to the Scouts of proving their worth and devotion to the public cause.

Immediately after the outbreak of war and following upon an appeal from Headquarters, it was decided to offer assistance to the Chief Constable of the City.

A Standing Camp was formed at Westbrook House, kindly lent by the Chairman of the Association, and over 100 boys immediately joined it for Special Service.

The Police decided to accept help in two directions. First of all for the guarding of the Waterworks in the outlying parts of the City, and secondly for messenger and general service duty at the several Police Stations of the City. Camps were therefore made at Redmires, Rivelin, and Strines.

The two first mentioned are still in existence, whilst the third has been disbanded on account of being outside the Sheffield Police area.

The Chief Constable expressed his warm appreciation of the services rendered, and an arrangement was made with the Watch Committee that they should subsidise the Association to the extent of 1s. per day per boy employed.

The expenses not covered by these grants amount to £70, which sum your Committee felt justified, in view of the national crisis, in drawing from the Fund for local Headquarters; it is hoped that the subscribers to that Fund will appreciate this action and agree with the Association in appropriating a portion of the Fund to the service of the City.

This public work has not been allowed to interfere in any way with either employment or school work, only those Scouts being used who were unemployed and over school age.
