SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Executive Committee beg to submit the following Report for the year 1915-16.

It may be well to take stock of the position and progress of the movement in Sheffield during the year. These are best represented by the actual number of Scouts in the Association, the numbers of new Troops, and the Reports of the Badge and Examination Committees.

Numbers.—With regard to numbers, these have risen from about 2,200 to about , ; and the number of Troops affiliated during the year total 6. This is considerably less than the number of Troops affiliated during the preceding year, owing not to any lack of enthusiasm for the movement, but to lack of potential Scoutmasters and others who can devote time to work amongst boys.

The Roll of Honour will show how heavily the Association has lost through enlistment amongst its Scoutmasters and members. This is largely temporary, and is a matter of which the Association is naturally proud; but we have also to greatly regret the loss of many who have been called to higher service notably the late Lieut. E. Y. Priestman, of the 16th Westbourne Troop. He was a true Scout and showed conspicuous ability and great promise.

The Badge Committee has endeavoured to raise the standard of efficiency and uniformity for all Badges, and has insisted upon all candidates for King's Scouts and First-class Badges being tested personally by the Committee.

Each Troop has been called upon to submit the names of the Examiners whom it proposes to employ; these names have been scrutinised and a list of approved Examiners for each Troop compiled. No Examiners, other than those on the lists, are recognised until their names have been laid before and accepted by the Committee. In this way the whole process has been systematised, with a consequent saving of work for both Scoutmasters and Badge Committee.

The Proficiency Badges include the Firemen's Badge. All Candidates for this particular Badge pass through the hands of Supt. F. W. Hadwick, to whom the Association is very deeply indebted for the systematic training of our boys.

It is suggested that a trophy for competition be offered during the coming year, which will be awarded to the Troop having the greatest proportion of King's Scouts, and it is hoped this will give an impetus to this branch of Scout work.

The Examination Committee held nine meetings during the year, at which 45 candidates presented themselves; of these, 12 were recommended to the Executive for Scoutmasters' warrants, 15 were recommended for Assistant Scoutmasters' warrants, 7 failed to obtain a sufficiently high standard of marks' 1 withdrew, and 10 were deferred until after the affiliation of the Troop and, in some cases, until they were eighteen years of age.

The activities of the Association as a whole have undoubtedly had to be curtailed owing to the reduced number of active Scoutmasters and supporters. The Association has, however, not been dormant as, perhaps, the following notes will show.

During the winter the Mobilization Scheme, for assisting the Police in possible air raids, which had been commenced in the preceding year, was in force, and was not abandoned until March, when the introduction of the warning by buzzers rendered these night duties of the Scouts unnecessary. It is gratifying to remember that the Chief Constable, in informing the Association that the services of the Scouts would no longer be required, expressed his appreciation of the services which had been rendered.

Lately again, however, the Police have asked for Scouts to co-operate in air-raid organisation, and there are now a large number of boys engaged in this work. The Scouts have also done valuable work on Coastguard Duty, particularly in Dorsetshire. The County Commissioner of that coast as far back as March last expressed himself as so satisfied with the work of Sheffield Scouts, that he decided to employ no others for the various coastguard stations in his district. Some sixteen boys have been on this duty at one time or another.

By the kindness of Mr. A. Warburton, an Association Ambulance Class was started in March, but after a life of a few weeks, had unfortunately to be given up, owing to various causes, amongst which were the difficulty of Scoutmasters in finding time to attend, and to the fact that several were called up for service.

Swimming.—During the summer months Scouts' Swimming Nights have been held at the Corporation Street and Park Baths. These have been fairly well attended and a large number of the boys have undoubtedly learned to swim owing to these facilities. Further than this, in response to a demand from the Eastern District, the Attercliffe Baths were also taken for one night a week from August to the end of September, with a further extension to the end of October, owing to its success during the first two months. The cost of the Association has been considerable as will be seen from the accompanying accounts.

It has been a pleasure to have a weekly contingent of the Hathersage Scouts as visitors to the Park Baths.

The thanks of the Association are due to all who have helped at the Baths, both Scoutmasters, Bath managers, and others.

In September the competition for the Edgar Allen Trophy took place at the Glossop Road Baths, but the Association unfortunately were compelled to withdraw their entry, owing to two of their boys being unable to attend the Baths. The Trophy was therefore handed over to the Boys' Brigade, who were the winners after a very close race with the Boys' Life Brigade. We beg to congratulate both these teams on their fine symming, and at the same time to thank Mr. Parker, of the 58th Troop, for his zeal in training our own team.

Camping.—During the summer also there have been various outdoor activities with the usual week and week-end Camps. In some cases Troops have been able to make themselves useful to the farmers in haymaking and other forms of work. This work has been fostered as much as possible by the Association, but it is felt that a great deal more could be done. One of the chief difficulties is the lack of confidence of the farmers in Scouts,

and this can only be won slowly and by dint of good behaviour and efficiency of the Scouts in general. One Troop in particular spent a holiday for the second year in succession helping on the farm on which they were camping. It is work of this sort where the Patrol system in seen to great advantage.

Patrol System.—The patrol idea is being encouraged as much as possible in Sheffield, and for this purpose two "booklets" on the subject have been issued free to all the Troops in the Association.

Useful and enjoyable Field Days have been held by both the Southern and Eastern districts.

WAR SAVINGS.—In response to the national demand for thrift, several Troops have embarked upon the War Savings schemes. In nearly every case these are run on Post Office lines, with the 15/6 Post Office savings cards. The idea was first put before the Association at a large meeting held at the Jungle on May 27th, at which the LORD MAYOR very kindly presided and spoke.

The Lord Mayor has taken a kind interest in this matter, and has several times enquired as to the progress of the scheme.

Although a number of Troops have not taken a collective part, it has been ascertained by the Scoutmasters that the boys are saving through their own churches and schools.

Scouts' Ambulance.—As an example of what can be done financially by the Scouts, we would mention that a fund was raised in aid of the Boy Scouts' Ambulance at the Front. Nov. 5th and 6th were set apart as days on which Scouts shoul I work to obtain money for the fund, and on Nov. 7th a Church Parade was held at the Jungle, after which the money was collected and amounted to over £70.

A letter was subsequently received from Headquarters stating that the Chief Scout wished the Sheffield Scouts to know how much he appreciated their splendid response to his appeal.

GUARDS OF HONOUR.—On two occasions the Scouts were invited to provide Guards of Honour. The first occasion was at the service at the Cathedral commemorating the institution of the Royal Regiment of Artillery. The second was at the service in memory of the late Lord Kitchener.

During the past twelve months various innovations have been introduced.

With regard to Scoutmasters' and Assistant Scoutmasters' Uniform, it has been decided that these shall not be worn for a longer period than six months, unless the Scoutmaster or Assistant has passed the Association examination for his Warrant, no official Badge being issued until the examination has been passed.

Blue has now ceased to be the standard Colour of the Scouts' Uniform in the Association, and Troops are at liberty to choose any colour mentioned in the Headquarters' rules.

Following upon the wish expressed by the Chief Scout, it has now been made incumbent upon all officers of the Association to make the three-fold Scout Officers' promise on election. This promise is as follows:—

"I promise on my honour-

- (1) To do my duty to God and the King.
- (2) To help other people at all times.
- (3) To carry out the spirit of the Scout law."

CLOTHING SCHEME.—The CLOTHING DEPOT has been transferred to new premises at 14, Meetinghouse Lane, where it is kindly presided over by Mr. W. Cooper. It was hoped that by this use of a central office, which is open all day and every day, the depot would be better patronised; but this has not proved to be the case, and although the prices are lower and the quality higher, we regret that Scoutmasters still send their boys established their equipment.

DIVISION INTO DISTRICTS.—One of the most satisfactory arrangements inaugurated has been the division of Meffield into five districts, each being in charge of a District Scoutmaster. This arrangement has very much facilitated the work of the Association and has proved a real stimulus to the movement in Sheffield. The districts have commenced to hold their own Scoutmasters' Meeting and Church Parales, etc., and have generally taken the initiative throughout the Association. Our very hearty congratulations and thanks are due to the District Scoutmasters who have worked hard and so successfully.

This system has also proved a saving to the Association in labour and postage in such matters as the distribution of Notices, Bulletins, Gazettes, etc., to the Troops and members.

In this connection it should be mentioned that the Association purchased a Roneo Duplicating Machine, for the duplication of the monthly Bulletins and Notices, with the idea of economising in the very heavy expense of printing. We are able to report that the saving effected has already covered the first cost of this machine.

The thanks of the Association are particularly due to Mr. Burnet and the Scouts of the 31st Troop, who have had the entire working of this machine.

The DRILL Book of the Association has been revised and slightly modified and we trust now will be found satisfactory to all Troops.

An attempt has been made to gain a footing for the Scouts' FRIENDLY SOCIETY in Sheffield. Owing to the War it was impossible to find a Secretary or any staff who could take up the work definitely, but after consultation with Headquarters, it was decided to enrol members direct with the Headquarters' branch, with the idea of forming our own "Camp" here at some later date. The advantage of joining the Scouts' Friendly Society, compared with the other Friendly Societies, is perhaps not yet fully appreciated in Sheffield, and is a matter which should be further taken up when the opportunity arises.

INDEMNITY INSURANCE.—Owing to its having been pointed out by Headquarters that Scoutmasters were legally liable for damage done both to and by Scouts whilst under their authority, it was decided by the Association to effect an Indemnity Insurance covering the whole Association. This policy remains in force until next March, after which a renewal will be necessary.

Bye-Laws.—Finally, a new set of Bye-Laws has been drawn up. This was also at the instigation of Headquarters, who expressed their anxiety for uniformity of Bye-Laws throughout the country, and a model set was forwarded by them. After considerable thought and discussion, various additions to these were made, and the final draft passed at a Quarterly Meeting held in June.

In looking back on the year's work as a whole, it would seem to have been satisfactory, taking into consideration the many difficulties imposed by the War. The success attained is due undoubtedly to the efforts of the Scoutmasters in general, and of the District Scoutmasters in particular, and also to the many supporters of the movement throughout the city, not the least of whom are the Press, who have kindly continued to issue the Association orders and notes in their publications.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR STARTING A TROOP OF BOY SCOUTS.

The Hon. Secretary is constantly receiving enquiries as to the starting of Troops of Scouts, and as to the formalities necessary for becoming affiliated with the Sheffield Local Association.

The following notes are meant as a guide to anyone desirous

of starting a Troop :-

It is usual for a Troop either to be connected with some institution or place of worship, or else to be supported by a committee. It is to be noted that, although Scoutmasters receive their warrants from the Boy Scouts' Association, it is desirable that they should be recommended by the body responsible for the continuance of the Troop.

Troops attached to places of worship usually ask that a member of the clergy be appointed chaplain to the Troop; chaplains' warrants are issued on the recommendation of the Local Association.

The first essential for a successful Troop is a suitable man as Scoutmaster. Whoever is selected for this position should consider the matter fully, and should also carefully read Sir Robert Baden-Powell's book "Scouting for Boys," in order that he may be sure that he is in sympathy with the aims and ideals of the movement.

This book, "Scouting for Boys," is the handbook and basis of the whole movement, and is obtainable from any bookseller for 1s.

Other useful publications are "Scout Tests, and how to pass them" (1s. 6d.), and also the Headquarters' "Gazette," which is issued monthly, and which can be obtained through the Association for an annual subscription of 2s. 6d.

The next essential is an Assistant Scoutmaster. At Assistant Scoutmaster is absolutely necessary, in order to charge continuity of work.

Intending Scoutmasters should therefore consider in whose hands they would like to leave the Troop in the event of their having, through unforeseen circumstances, to give up the position, and they should ask these friends to become members of the Troop.

The third essential is a suitable room for headquarters. This should be a room or rooms relonging, as much as possible, to the Troop, and in which the Scouts can take a pride and pleasure in helping to fit up, etc.

As soon as the above essentials have been assured and it is definitely decided to form the Troop, the Scoutmaster should, if possible, call upon either the District Scoutmaster, Mr. E. Morse, Norfolk Works, or the Hon. Scoretary, Mr. H. D. Sawtell, 23, Moor Oaks Road (tel., 401 Broomhill). Appointments in any case should be made by postcated or telephone, the most convenient time being between 8 and 9 o clock in the evening.

The prospective Scoutmaster will then be given the proper affiliation forms to fill up and return to the Secretary, and will also be given a copy of the Association folder, containing the

rules and general information.

It is as well to start a Troop on a small scale; say, with eight or ten boys only. These few boys should be carefully chosen, and then trained for some three or four months. When these few have been well trained and proved to be reliable, the best of them may be made Patrol Leaders, and "seconds." Other boys may then be admitted to the Troop and put under these Patrol Leaders. By thus starting carefully, and in a small way, it will be found that after a few months there is a nucleus of a thoroughly sound Troop, which will expand on the right lines, and with infinitely less trouble than if a start had been made with large numbers.

It is then necessary that the Troop should be formed and actually worked for some weeks, or, at any rate, until the Scoutmaster considers that he has got the organisation on a sound basis.

The Hon. Secretary should then be informed that the Troop is ready for official visitation by the Association, and he will arrange for some member of the Executive Committee to visit the Troop on one of its meeting nights.

The visitor will examine the Troop, and according to the rules of the Association it is necessary that all the Patrol Leaders should be found to be well up to "Tenderfoot" standard.

If the visitor is satisfied that the Troop answers these tests and is in every other way satisfactory, he will report this at the next Executive Committee Meeting, and the Troop will then be duly proposed for affiliation.

After election, an affiliation fee of 2s. 6d. and an annual subscription of 2s. 6d. must be paid.

Each Troop in the Association has a neckerchief of distinctive colours. These colours must be settled in consultation with the Hon. Secretary, in order that there may be no duplicates.

There is a special Troop, under the charge of Lieut. C. M. Foot, R.N., for the training of prospective Scoutmasters. This Troop, however, is in abeyance for the time being.
